Municipal Liability - Stabbing - Prisoner in Sleeping Area

Plaintiff's decedent was a prisoner at a medium-security prison maintained by Defendant District of Columbia in Occoquan, VA. Decedent was attacked and fatally stabbed by another prisoner in the sleeping area of the prison dormitory. A duty post in the sleeping area was unmanned at the time of the incident and the only two guards on duty were patrolling other areas of the dormitory. A federal court order required three guards to be present at all times.

Plaintiff alleged that defendant failed to provide a reasonable level of supervision in providing only two guards when three guards were required, and by failing to have a guard on duty at a post which should have been manned at all times. Further, defendant was negligent in failing to adequately control contraband weapons in the facility.

Defendant contended that they complied with the standard of care and that decedent did not survive for more than five minutes.

Plaintiff Personal Data: Plaintiff's decedent was a 26 year old single black male who was incarcerated.

Alleged Injury: Multiple injuries, including contusions, abrasions, lacerations and five penetrating stab wounds (one to heart), resulting in death following 10 to 15 minutes of pain and suffering. Decedent was survived by two minor children.
